MORE ON PINE BEETLES!!

A homeowner recently lost two 60 foot Austrian pine trees to pine beetle damage because he was unaware of the inexpensive yet effective spray treatment available through tree service companies.

The spray must be applied in September and April and is effective on Spruce, Ponderosa, Austrian and Scotch pine trees.



WASTE CONNECTIONS UPDATE

The Board of Directors will meet with Waste Connections management on October 21st. The current weekly pickup of 1 to 2 cans and up to 4 additional bags of yard waste will continue until the Board and WC have reached an agreement.

The Board is aware of homeowner concerns about the change in pickup practices. The Board understands that many homeowners do not want to switch to 96 and 64 gallon containers.

Homeowners have expressed concerns about where to store such large containers. Additionally homeowners are worried that one 96 gallon container won't be large enough to contain both trash and yard waste during the summer and fall.

We will keep you apprised of discussions between the Board of Directors and Waste Connections.



HOMESTEAD IN THE WILLOWS HOMEOWNERS ASSOCIATION

Regular Board Meeting September 9, 2019 – Unofficial Minutes

CALL TO ORDER: President, Jamie Von Feldt, called the meeting to order at 6:33 p.m. Board Members present were Donald Luther, Emily Maxfield, Ross King and Bruce Thorne. Also attending were Business Manager, Katie Kidwell; Landscape Manager, Nancy Bauer; Pool Manager, Jaylene Jones, Tennis Manager, Jill Ellsworth and Swim Team Parent Representative Lezlie Roosa. Homeowners Mark Dwyer, Dave & Kelly Lewis and Kristy Pankow also attended a portion of the meeting.

MINUTES: The minutes of the August 12, 2019 regular meeting were approved as read.

SWIM TEAM: Lezlie reported that the Swim Team had priced replacements for the broken display case at the North Pool. Jaylene Jones offered to have FRR install the new case. Emily moved and Donald seconded a motion to pay for a new display case for Swim Team. Motion passed unanimously.

MANAGER REPORTS

- 1. POOL: Manager Jaylene Jones went through her proposed 2020 budget with the Board and discussed necessary repairs and purchases at each pool location. The South Pool heater failed prior to Labor Day weekend. Jaylene reminded the Board that due to steel tariff's the cost of a new heater has been climbing over the last few weeks. Emily moved and Donald seconded a motion to purchase a new heater immediately. FRR will store the heater and install it next spring. Motion passed unanimously.
- 2. LANDSCAPE: Manager Nancy Bauer submitted a written report noting various repairs and replacements throughout the property. Despite replacing sections of split rail fence, trees and installing a new basketball hoop at the North Pool, Landscape is under budget by \$20,000 because the irrigation company has not needed to make as many repairs. Nancy and the irrigation company submitted a request to invest in Smart Controllers which would save the HOA money by reducing the time spent on repairs and more efficiently managing water with remote shutoff capabilities.
- 3. TENNIS: Manager Jill Ellsworth reported that new divider nets will be installed at the West Courts the week of September 16th. Tidy cans and scoring towers will be removed at the end of September and windscreens will be rolled up for the season. Jill and the Board discussed maintenance needs for the court complexes and her proposed budget for 2020.
- 4. BUSINESS: Katie reported the pool gates were on winter schedule and the land lines had been disconnected. She submitted a proposed 2020 budget for Administrative costs and for Utilities.

HOMEOWNER COMMENTS & APPEALS: The Board reviewed one written appeal and agreed to an extension. Account 556 appealed to the Board to overturn an ACC decision. It became apparent that the Business Office had misunderstood the ACC's position and the Board directed the homeowner to present their appeal to the ACC at their meeting in September.

ACC & TASK FORCE REPORT: Task Force Chair Nancy Parker notified the Board that 43 driveways were cited by volunteers as needing replacement. After Board member review, 27 homeowners would be notified that replacement is necessary within three years. The Board and Nancy discussed the Task Force checklist used by the volunteers and agreed to work on re-writing the checklist for clarity prior to next year.

FINANCIAL REPORT: Treasurer Bruce Thorne announced the Association faced several large capital expenses in addition to the Perimeter Fence such as pool concrete, a new heater for the South Pool, and a stormwater drain repair. The HOA has created a Perimeter Fence fund for the purpose of replacing the Perimeter Fence in the near future. Expenses totaled \$134,794 during the month of July and included \$31,073 for Land Maintenance, \$30,864 for Pool expenses, \$60,069 for Trash & Utilities, \$4,653 of Tennis expenses and \$9.134 in Administrative expenses.

OLD BUSINESS: WASTE CONNECTIONS: will attend the October Board meeting. Weekly pickup will continue to be 1 to 2 cans and up to 4 bags of yard waste until the Board and Waste Connections management meet and reach an agreement. PICKLEBALL: The pickleball community will hold an instruction event on September 15th during their regularly scheduled court time of 4pm to 6pm. Pickleball players are asked to remove the tape used for pickleball lines immediately after play. SEMSWA: The HOA attorney determined that ownership of the storm drain that runs from Easter Avenue north to Costilla Avenue does belong to the HOA. The Board will discuss possible repair solutions at the October meeting. EASTER ENTRANCE ISLAND: Ross King discussed the island with Village I who shares maintenance responsibility. Village I believes the plants that died were planted incorrectly but remains willing to work with Homestead on future shrub care.

NEW BUSINESS: Account 607 sent photos to the Board of a sidewalk repair made by the City of Centennial using asphalt instead of grinding and repairing the concrete. The repair is unattractive and not in keeping with the neighborhood standards. Account 607 asked the Board to lodge a formal complaint with Centennial. The Board directed Katie to do so.

ADJOURNMENT AND CALENDARING: The meeting adjourned at 8:58 pm. The next regular Board Meeting will be on Monday, October 21st, at 6:30 p.m. at the Business Office.

LANDSCAPE LOGIC

End of season Project:

We're now in the best "zone" for planting bulbs--when night-time lows are in the 40- to 50-degree range and when the soil temperature at planting depth hits 55 degrees. You can test the soil with a soil probe--or even a meat thermometer if you can push it 3- to 6-inches deep into the soil.

Plant several pockets of bulbs in the most visible areas of your beds. Next spring, an emerging group of tulips or daffodils will create a bright pop of color nestled among still-dormant perennials.

Avoid planting bulbs all in a row like little soldiers. Instead, plant groups of 10-12 bulbs together with a few inches between each bulb. Leave more space between larger bulbs.

Fertilize and aerate your lawn:

Fertilize one more time in the last half of October. Ironically, it's the two fall-ish fertilizations--the one around Labor Day and the one in late October--that are two of the three most important times to fertilize the lawn.

Use a lawn fertilizer that has plenty of nitrogen, less phosphorous and potassium. Some examples would be 20-10-5, 11-5-5, or 21-7-11. After the stresses of summer, grasses need to build carbohydrate reserves to endure the winter; it is nitrogen that is needed to promote carbohydrate production.



Don't prune trees and shrubs:

Avoid the temptation to prune trees and shrubs in late fall. Deciduous trees and shrubs, as well as evergreens, do not have the ability tor time to close up wounds when they are dormant or semi-dormant. Heavy pruning should be accomplished in mid to late spring, when plants can rapidly heal pruning cuts.



Protect trees from sunscald damage:

'Sunscald' is a term referring to dead tree tissue occurring from direct sunrays heating up tree tissue in mid winter and freezing nighttime temperatures that kill the activated tissue. This is a severe threat to newly planted trees; consequently, they should receive protection for at least (2) years.

Commercial tree wraps are an effective method of preventing sunscald damage. Starting at the trunk's base, overlap the wrap as it is applied upward to a point above the second branch. Attach the wrap at the top and bottom with a single tack or electric tape. This wrap will need to be removed in mid April to prevent insect damage.

Early Frosts:

Now is the time to begin paying attention to the weather forecasts for predictions of early frosts. Cover plants if necessary.

COMMENTS FROM YOUR NEIGHBORS

MOTORIZED BIKES & SCOOTERS

If your child has a motorized bike or scooter, please remind him/her that such vehicles should not be ridden on the walking paths throughout the neighborhood. The cement paths that run through the greenbelts are for pedestrians. Not all the pedestrians are able to get out of the way quickly should your child overtake them on a motorized vehicle.

TRASH CAN PLACEMENT

& STORAGE

Storing your trash cans out of view of the street is not only required by the Homestead Declarations and Restrictions, but by the City of Centennial Code as well.

When putting your trash cans out for pickup, Centennial Code states that the cans should either be on a homeowners property (i.e. the driveway) or in the gutter on the street. Please refrain from placing your cans on the sidewalk where they force pedestrians to step around them into the street.


ACC Advice -- Just because you see it, doesn't mean it's approved.

Whenever you are planning on changing anything external to your home or yard, you must get Architectural Control Committee (ACC) approval.

Just because you see a front door, garage door or window style that might seem novel or different within our community, doesn't mean that it is ACC approved. Over decades as the community and ACC members changed, sometimes adherence to the basic Colonial style elements were eased and sometimes homeowners made changes without approval.

Homestead in the Willows was designed by Sanford Homes as a traditional colonial community. Did you know that each of our home models was named after a colonial general? In 2006 the ACC developed the Homestead Colonial Aesthetic to clarify the original architectural design. Adhering to the aesthetic means ACC approvals are consistent as the committee members change.

The responsibility of the ACC is to maintain the overall look and feel of our community design which means limiting the variances. The current ACC members made a review of front door and garage door styles, and paint colors along with other design elements and have reduced the number of variations reverting back to the basics of our original community design.

How to protect the backflow device from freeze damage:

Turn the valve handle at a 45-degree angle.

Wrap the device with a towel to provide insulation.

To keep moisture out, cover the whole device with a plastic bag that you secure with duct tape around the bottom.

If you have not yet scheduled having your sprinkler system winterized by blowing out the lines with compressed air, schedule your service appointment soon.



Don't Forget to Water:

Especially new plantings, but also anything in your landscape, water every 3-4 weeks throughout fall and winter if we have no snow cover. Our soils can become extremely dry during winter and roots still need to have moisture to survive.

Evergreens can also benefit from a 'water scrub'. Use a nozzle that will let you apply a strong, full force spray; start at the top of the plant and work downward.

Scrubbing will remove summer's build up of dust and pollution, freeing up the little 'breathing holes (stoma) in the needles. That leads to healthier trees with less stress. Water scrubbing also washes off insects such as aphids and spider mites, loose scale insects and eggs along with dead brown needles.

ACC FAQ'S

The Architectural Control Committee (ACC) Process

What is the task of the ACC? -- The ACC is an essential part of the HOA and its oversight helps preserve the essential architectural design and visual community aesthetic of Homestead in the Willows; also helping to maintain property values. It was established by the HOA governing documents and reviews and approves or denies applications for architectural changes.

What happens with an "Application for Architectural Change?" Two ACC members sign off on each application. They review the application to see if it is complete, if the project scope is clear, and it has the required information. If further information is needed, they call the homeowner to discuss the project and request what they need. In some cases a physical site visit is necessary as in exterior painting. Some applications are basic and can be reviewed quickly; others are complex requiring time, research and discussion with other ACC members. The more information the ACC has the better to understand the application request.

The ACC uses the "Residential Improvement Guidelines" and "Colonial Aesthetic" as references. They also have new and revised paint sample boards, new and revised front door and garage door boards, and approved alternate roofing materials sheet. All of these materials are available to homeowners.

Who can approve an "Application for Architectural Change?" Only an ACC member can approve or deny an "Application for Architectural Change." All decisions must be in writing.

How long does an application take to get approved? The ACC has up to 30 days to approve or deny an application. Usually applications are returned in two weeks. Timing depends on what ACC members are available as they are volunteers.

Who is on the ACC and how do they function? The ACC is made up of community volunteers and currently there are six members. They have relevant backgrounds and training on the ACC process. They meet monthly to discuss unique applications, and constantly learn more about our community and about the architectural aesthetic of "Colonial".

Are all applications approved? Not every application is approved. Some proposed projects are outside of the aesthetic and are denied. Some projects have aspects that are not approved and are denied until all aspects of the project are approvable. When an application is denied, the ACC provides a letter to homeowners stating the problem and/or possible resolutions with their application.

What are some basics of Colonial style? Overall, the Colonial style is admired for its simple lines and subdued colors emphasizing woods and other natural materials. One of the most notable aspects is the symmetrical structure. Most are square or rectangular in shape with brick or clapboard wood siding. Colonial style homes may consist of one or more stories, and some have flanking wings. Another aspect of this style is the balanced arrangement of windows. Most homes feature a window on each side of the entry way and three to five windows on the second floor. The windows are most often multi-paned, double-hung with shutters. Finally, the style uses a rectangular or horizontal front typically constructed of brick, usually unadorned and free of embellishments.
